
The Big Conversations series comprises webinars, workshops, and roundtables that enable our members to:

Hospice Reach, UK, 2023-24

2023-24:

Hospices across the UK provided palliative and end of life care to 310,000 people

Hospices provided direct support services to **92,000** family and loved ones


Compared to last year:

Care to patients is slightly higher than last year (although it is slightly lower in the children's sector)

Care to family and loved ones is significantly higher than last year due to a focus on better reporting

Hospice Activity Contacts, UK, 2023-24


- Activity contacts:
- **740,000** visits were made by specialist palliative care nurses and doctors to hospice patients at home.
- **740,000** visits were made by generalist healthcare staff to hospice patients at home (including nurses, healthcare assistants, social workers and carers).
- **810,000** outpatient appointments were made by hospices for physiotherapy, counselling and other support services.
- 630,000 days and nights of inpatient care were provided by hospices in the UK.
- 440,000 appointments were provided to patients' families and carers, including counselling and bereavement support.



Where care is delivered, UK, 2023-24

- 55% of hospice activity was delivered in a person's place of residence
- 45% of hospice activity was delivered in a hospice or hospital building
- 18% of hospice activity was in a hospice inpatient unit
- This is the same as last year




Place of care by nation, 2023-24

- ► The NAHH was originally established in September 2000 as the National Forum for Hospice at Home, the name was changed from forum to association in 2010 to reflect the growing body of member services.
- In August 2014, the NAHH became a registered Charitable Incorporated Organisation, and the Executive Committee became Trustees of the charity



- Trustees are all experienced professionals who have gained knowledge of palliative and end of life care and are currently working or have worked in organisations that provide Hospice at Home. Trustees and committee work as an addition to their normal employment and requires attendance at a minimum of six meetings a year, an annual conference and quarterly learning network meetings.
- Associate trustees are experienced professionals who may not have the capacity to commit to full Trustee role, but their expertise is vital to NAHH in order to provide up to date evidence based and practice based support to the members.
- We are all volunteers



Membership

- Hospice at Home is a core service in enabling end of life care at home. NAHH is dedicated to promoting the cause of Hospice at Home at a local, regional, and national level. It's elected executive committee welcomes applications for membership from:
- Hospice at Home services
- Services providing palliative/end of life care at home which may, or may not, have hospice in their title
- Services planning to set up a hospice at home service or equivalent
- Membership includes NHS services and those working in collaboration with others
- ► The membership year runs from 1 April 31 March and the cost for each organisation to join is £125 per year. Organisations can join the NAHH as a member via the website








APDS SURVEY RESULTS


IS YOUR DAY SERVICE CURRENTLY OPEN?








